

Is the Youth Employment and Training Program Right for You?

The Youth Employment and Training Program might be right for you if you are willing to make a commitment to yourself, the case manager, and the program.

You will be involved in activities that help you succeed in school and succeed on the job.

Activities could include:

- Working with a tutor to improve your grades.
- Getting help with skills you need in school, such as studying and organizing your time.
- Learning about alternative schools or Job Corps.
- Connecting what you learn in school with an actual job.
- Exploring different careers and industries near your home.
- Participating in job shadowing.
- Exploring your leadership potential and discovering your talents, strengths, and challenges.
- Gain knowledge on checking and credit scores.
- Gaining skills so that you will be able to find employment for yourself.
- Looking for future job advancement opportunities, reviewing job requirements, and preparing yourself for better jobs as they become available.
- Talking to a career planner.

Before we can determine the kinds of activities that would be right for you, let's get together and take a look at your current skills and abilities, the things that interest you, and the challenges you face. This process takes some time, but it is an important part of the program.

Not everyone who is eligible is selected to be involved with the WIOA Youth Program.

- Develop job skills.
- Research career and education options.
- Develop and surround yourself with a supportive network of family and friends.

Think about the following steps as you plan for employment:

- Finding and preparing for a job
- Furthering your education
- Gaining experience
- Making a positive impression

Activities that you will be involved in are designed to help you overcome your challenges.

Your youth case manager will visit with you on a regular basis to review your progress. This review could lead to more challenging activities, or a job in your area of interest.
